## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Over the past five months, I've had many opportunities to witness how the Brebeuf staff, students and parents work together in support of meaningful learning experiences, as well as faith and community development. This newsletter highlights some of the ways this was accomplished in the first half of the 2008 – 2009 academic year.

We continue to develop our Student Success Strategy as outlined by the Ministry of Education and coordinated by the TCDSB. Providing quality learning experiences for all our students is a high priority. The tradition of promoting academic excellence continues here at Brebeuf with additional attention being given to expanding opportunities for student success. Earlier this year, students participated in a survey to help us better understand the Brebeuf student of today. Technology is an important tool and the acquisition of more computers to support student learning is a priority.

Faith development is highly valued here at Brebeuf, with the traditional focus on developing "men for others". In addition to our religion program, school Masses, morning paraliturgies and school retreats, students and staff have been putting their faith into action by organizing and generously contributing to a number of important fund raising events.

Our athletics and arts programmes, as well as our clubs and committees, continue to provide important community building opportunities. In the first semester, Brebeuf fielded teams that included golf, soccer, volleyball, cross country, swimming, hockey, tennis and basketball. In December, Theatre Brebeuf presented the play *You Could Die Laughing* and the Arts department hosted its second annual Arts Fest to showcase dramatic and visual arts presentations and a band concert. The Catholic School Advisory Council, co-chaired by Louise Whitfield, and the Brebeuf Alumni Association also continue to support our school community in a variety of ways. One example of this was the annual Communion Breakfast last October with former Brebeuf chemistry teacher, Father Donald Beaudois S.J. celebrating Mass.

Projections based on the January 2009 registration of our own students and the registration of Grade 8 students demonstrate that Brebeuf continues to be a place where many want their sons to be educated. We thank everyone in the community for their support and look forward to a second semester that will continue to provide valuable and cherished learning experiences for all.

## TANZANIA EXPERIENCE

Grade 12 students **Will Cerre** and **Sean Canaran** travelled to Tanzania this past summer to help build a windmill under the auspices of the Precious Blood Fathers. This project provides water and food for a village and is an excellent example of Brebeufians putting their faith into action. Next summer, **Ms. Ms. Loranger** will bring five Brebeuf students to Kenya for a similar experience.

## SOCIAL JUSTICE SYMPOSIUM

Brebeuf hosted its fifth annual Social Justice Symposium in December at the University of Toronto. Over 200 students from across the city came to hear from guest speakers and attend workshops on the theme of "Awareness of Unfairness: Connecting with the Developing World".

"The theme arose from planning discussions in our Faith, Peace and Justice group, which is modelled on similar groups at other Presentation schools," according to Michael Da Costa, a teacher and one of the event's moderators. "Our students are aware of the Developing World through the Brother Maher Fund for Africa, a fundraising and education campaign to support the Presentation Brothers' school in Yendi, Ghana."

After Mass, students heard from the day's keynote speaker, **Father James Webb, S.J.**, the Provincial of the Jesuits in English Canada and a former teacher at Brebeuf. Father Webb has just returned to Toronto after twenty years in

Jamaica. He had much to say about social justice and how big changes can come about in small steps and with one person at a time.

Students also heard from a Rwandan genocide survivor, watched a documentary on child worker rights in India, and saw a slideshow presentation by a Brebeuf student who helped build a windmill and work in orphanages in Tanzania.

The day ended with students participating in workshops run by social justice groups working in Toronto and the Developing World, giving students concrete ways to get involved and put their faith into action. \$1000 was donated for education in the poor parts of Jamaica and the various charity groups.

"If even a few students become engaged in social justice causes as a result of the Symposium, then I'd call it a success," added Mr. Da Costa.

## EDMUND RICE VOLUNTEER AWARDS



Eight Brebeuf students were recognized with the Edmund Rice Volunteer Awards at Awards Night in October. These students gave of their time in serving local charities and their neighbours. Based on a similar programme in the Presentation Brothers' Irish schools, the students volunteered a minimum of twenty hours of service and reflected on their service in light of their faith and the life of Blessed Edmund Rice, founder of the Presentation Brothers.

Some of the projects in which they were involved included: working for the poor in the St. Vincent de Paul Society, helping at a food bank, and working in a soup kitchen. Each student received a certificate from **Brother Henry Spencer F.P.M.**, the school chaplain.

According to **Mr. Da Costa**, "These young men exemplify our school's ethos of forming "men for others" and we hope that many more students become part of the awards programme this year."

## STUDENT COUNCIL UPDATE

The Student Council has had a busy semester planning activities to increase spirit and make school fun! Some of the highlights so far this year:

- hundreds of Brebeuf leather jackets and scarves were sold and allow students to show their school pride;
- the Bullworth mascot made a reappearance after a brief holiday and helps raise the roof at after-school games;
- the Hallowe'en Dance was sold out and over 500 students from Brebeuf, Loretto, and St. Joseph's attended;
- planning is coming to fruition for the upcoming Semi-Formal Dance;
- Casual Days have raised thousands of dollars for the Catholics for Faith & Life (C.F.L.) club and the Brother Lawrence Maher Fund for Africa;
- a video games week held during lunches was popular with many students;

- a new full-colour school crest now adorns the Atrium and provides a focal point for school pride.

The Student Council looks forward to planning many more activities in the second term.

### A.P. AND ENRICHED COURSES

In 2009-10, Brebeuf will be offering the following Pre-A.P. and A.P. Enriched courses: English (10,11,12); History (10); Mathematics (10,11,12); Religion (10); and Science (10,11).

Students who take Pre-A.P. / A.P. Enriched courses will: be better prepared to write Advanced Placement examinations in Grade 12; study university-level material before the end of Grade 12; be challenged by high expectations in a class with similarly-motivated peers; spend less time on rote learning and more on theory, class discussions, excursions, and activities; move at a faster pace than regular courses; and begin university courses at an advantage over classmates since some material will have been previously studied.

Those who are successful in A.P. exams can be granted university credits for work completed in high school. If you have any questions about Enriched courses or AP examinations, please contact Mr. Da Costa.

### BREBEUF CHAPLAINCY UPDATE



Second Semester began with a Communion Service in the Chapel at 8:00 a.m. Attendance was optional; however, it was well attended. This service is a daily feature of life at Brebeuf.

In keeping with the mind of the Church for Lent, Mass will be celebrated by **Father Len Altilia S.J.** in our atrium on Ash Wednesday, February 25th. Lent is an important time for developing Christian values and personal spiritual growth. Two special services will be held in the gym on Holy Thursday when the “washing of the feet” will take place.

Our Lenten Day of Reconciliation Celebration will take place on Tuesday, March 3rd. A number of priests have been invited to be confessors and many avail of this opportunity.

During the second semester retreats are held for Grades 10, 11, and 12. Our retreat for Grade 11 is tied in to the Grade 11 program “Exploring World Religions.” The students are bussed to various houses of worship on Bayview Avenue i.e. Har Zion Synagogue, the Mosque and the Buddhist Temple. At each location a speaker outlines the beliefs, traditions and customs of his/her religions. Students have opportunities to ask questions and get some answers. Students in Grade 10 go to the Jesuit Retreat Centre, Manresa, in Pickering and the Grade 12 students attend their retreat at Our Lady Queen of Apostles in Mississauga.

A Mass is always celebrated in our Chapel on the First Friday of each month. **Father Winston Rye, S.J.** is our usual celebrant. A closing Mass for the present school year will be celebrated in our gym on Friday June 5th, 2009. The Brebeuf community is most grateful to the Jesuit Fathers for their continued service and ministry to the life of the school.

The Virtue of the Month of February is Love. In January, it was the practice of the Virtue of Courage. During the month of January the Virtue of Courage was talked and prayed over as part of Morning Prayer.

Each Tuesday afternoon some students go to Gibson House on Steeles Avenue East where they play “Bingo” with the elderly people. The staff at the home are grateful to the students who give time to help and be with the elderly. Brother Henry and I extend our best wishes to all students and staff for a successful and safe semester at Brebeuf College.
