Rome wasn't built in a day, and neither will the new Brebeuf College. After many delays, a replacement building for Brebeuf is one step closer to reality. In a surprise move, the Toronto Catholic School Board announced recently that Brebeuf will be housed temporarily in the old Bathurst Heights Collegiate during the construction of our new building at 211 Steeles Avenue East. The school community will be moved in early February until the new Brebeuf is ready in September, 2003.

New School Building

This move to Bathurst Heights saves money, shortens the construction time, and allows for Brebeuf to be properly accommodated away from construction noise. In fact, this is the first time that Brebeuf students will be housed in one building since the early Jesuit days of the school! Bathurst Heights, at Lawrence Avenue West and Bathurst Street, is currently empty. It is built for 1900 students and boasts three gyms, a pool, a 500 seat auditorium, and more space than we can imagine. While the move will be a difficult adjustment, we are confident that our traditions, spirit, and sense of community will remain and return with us to the new Brebeuf.

Principal's Message

In September, 1963, Brebeuf College School opened its doors, admitting the first 175 students into a school that was committed to academic excellence, Catholic values, and the development of well-rounded young men. This past September, we welcomed our thirtyninth group of grade nine students. While society has changed significantly since '63 and our school responded well to these changes, I am pleased to report that some thinas remain constant. Brebeuf continues to be known for academic excellence, a strong commitment to gospel values, and a broad offering of sports teams, clubs and activities for students who wish to become involved in the life of their school. Brebeuf College has remained faithful to the vision of the school articulated nearly 40 years ago by the Jesuit fathers.

As a school community, we are moving into an exciting period of growth and change. Within a few months, this tired old building which has been our home for nearly forty years will be demolished. For a period of eighteen months we will re-locate to another site while our new building is built. In September, 2003, we expect to return to 211 Steeles Avenue East, where we will celebrate both the fortieth anniversary of the school and the opening of our new building. The coming year presents two significant challenges. On the one hand, we need to ensure that the spirit of Brebeuf, the best of our traditions, and the quality of our programs carry on throughout the period of transition, and carry over into the new building. On the other hand, we must use the new facility as an opportunity to update our curriculum, integrate new and emerging technologies into all our programs, and to align the educational experience we offer to our students with real-world applications and expectations.

Brebeuf has always been known not just as a school, but as a centre for academic excellence. It is our hope that our alumni will play an active role in assisting the school to continue this tradition. The new building will allow us to offer many new and exciting programs, and some of the fundraising goals being discussed by the alumni will be critical to ensure that the new facility is fully and properly equipped. While financial support is appreciated, the expertise of our alumni is an even more valuable resource. Our graduates are remarkably accomplished in a variety of fields, and it is time for us to draw upon your experience and expertise as we make our plans for the future.

Brebeuf is on the move, growing and changing in order to stay competitive and responsible in delivering a quality, Catholic education. The closing ceremony and reunion on Saturday, January 26, 2002, will provide all of the members of our community with an opportunity to gather together to celebrate the past, the present and the future of Brebeuf College. Pautler Appointed Principal

Mike Pautler, Brebeuf class of '76, was appointed as the seventh principal of Brebeuf in February, 2001, twenty five years after graduating high school. Mike is the first graduate of Brebeuf to serve as principal and has returned to his alma mater to oversee the construction of the new Brebeuf campus.

Mike's appointment as Principal marks his third "tour of duty" at 211 Steeles Avenue East. Upon graduation in 1976 Mike attended the University of Toronto, graduating with a degree in English and History and a Bachelor of Education. Mike joined the Brebeuf faculty in September, 1980 teaching English for six years before moving on. He was the head of the English Department at Dante Alighieri Academy and then headed up the programme for deaf and hard of hearing students at Mother Teresa C.S.S. After serving as vice principal at Cardinal Newman, Mike was appointed as principal of Chaminade College in 1995.

In 1997, he became the founding principal of Marshall McLuhan Catholic Secondary School, where he oversaw the construction of a brand new school facility; an experience that will certainly be of value as he leads Brebeuf through the most physically significant transformation in its history.

During his short tenure as Principal, Mike has established very strong ties with the Alumni Association and all of the Brebeuf community. Welcome home, Mike!

For many of us who were in the Concert Band in the seventies, the trip to Europe in 1978 was a highlight. It began March 16th, when 72 students under the musical direction of John Volpe boarded a flight from Toronto to Zurich. Upon arriving, we loaded the instruments, luggage and ourselves into two Mercedes buses and headed for Weggis, a picturesque town on the shores of Lake Lucerne.

For the next four days we gave concerts in parks, shopping malls and casinos in both Weggis and Lucerne. We also enjoyed much of the local charm and hospitality, as only 72 high school boys can.

After our stay in Weggis, we boarded an overnight train bound for Northern Italy via the Alps. In the middle of the night, we were stopped at the Italian border and machine gun toting police boarded the train. Italian authorities were on high alert after the recent kidnapping of Aldo Moro, an Italian Cabinet Minister who was later assassinated by the Red Brigade, a terrorist group. The border police removed our instruments and searched them before allowing the train to continue into Italy. Eventually, we arrived in Florence where we stayed for a few days playing concerts and sight-seeing, then bused south to Assisi, an exquisite hillside town made famous by St. Francis, the patron saint of animals.

Our final tour stop was Rome. We gazed at the Sistine Chapel, attended the Pope's Easter Sunday mass in St. Peter's square (along with a few hundred thousand others), and otherwise explored Rome's many riches (not the least of which included liberal drinking laws).

The highlight of the trip was our performance during a general audience for Pope Paul VI, in which the band competed with choirs, sports teams, chapters of the Knights of Columbus, and various other groups for the Pope's attention. What our band lacked in talent, we made up for with enthusiasm. When we played "Great Themes from Great Italian Movies" (our signature piece for this part of the tour) the Pope beamed, came right over, and waved his hand at us in blessing after blessing.

There is a faded, grainy picture clipped from The Toronto Star, dated Thursday, March 30, 1978. In it we are all posing proudly in our white tuxedo jackets and black dress pants in St. Peter's Square on a beautiful afternoon, and we have just played for the Pope. And even in a newspaper clipping over 20 years old, you can see in our faces a glow, as if in that moment in time we had all been touched by grace.




