TECHNOLOGY@BREBEUF A BLUEPRINT FOR OUR FUTURE

The key to preparing students well for the challenges and opportunities that will present themselves in the future is to develop their ability to think critically, to communicate effectively, and to make sound judgements within an ethical framework. As our students will live, work and play within an increasingly complex and technologically advanced world, ideally our educational program should naturally and seamlessly integrate the use of information and communication technology into all aspects of the curriculum.In this way, each student will be encouraged to use technology in a variety of ways, including:

- As a learning tool
- As a research tool
- As a creativity or productivity tool
- As an analytic tool
- As a communication tool

The successful integration of technology into the curriculum depends upon a strong technical infrastructure, the development of appropriate skills for both teachers and students, clear program directions and curriculum, and adequate access for all community members to the technology itself.

While some of these goals will be realized only with the completion of our new building in September, 2003, many exciting initiatives are already underway, or will be introduced next September. In this way, we build our capacity to benefit from the new facilities in the future, while ensuring that our current students, even those who will graduate prior to the completion of the new building, can still share in some of the benefits of the new Brebeuf.

Communications Technology


A new program offered this coming September, Communications Technology will provide students with an opportunity to develop skills in digital imaging, desk-top publishing, web page design, video production and computer-based animation. A new lab, featuring Apple computers, will be available in September, 2002.

Cross-Curricular Lab

As our temporary location provides sufficient space, we have been able to introduce a cross-curricular computer lab. Teachers and students can now access a computer lab throughout the day to gain access to basic productivity tools and to the internet. This allows for increased integration of technology into core subject areas.

On-line Learning

In conjunction with the Toronto Catholic District School Board,



a number of our teachers are involved in developing on-line curriculum. Already, students in many of our classes are able to access learning resources, retrieve and submit homework and assignments, and check their marks on line, using a software program called "e-class". By next September, some students will be able to take entire courses on line, providing increased flexibility for scheduling. On-line offerings for the 2002-2003 school year will include: Gr. 10 Canadian History, Gr. 10 Civics and Career Education, Gr. 11 World History, Gr. 11 Computer Science and Gr. 11 English Media.

Computer Engineering

A new program offered at Brebeuf this coming September will provide students with an opportunity to learn about the engineering side of computer technology, including networking, switch and systems design, circuitry, and robotics.

New Computers

By accessing some of the equipment budget for our new building, we will ensure that today's students at Brebeuf College benefit from our re-construction just as surely as our future students will. Throughout this Spring and Summer, we will take delivery of approximately 60 new computers. This will provide improved access to technology for all students and all programs.

The re-development of Brebeuf College School is well underway, and to this point, the project is right on schedule.

On Monday, February 4, 2002, classes began at our new campus on Lawrence Ave W. and by February 15, the building was emptied, the locks had been changed, and possession of the property had passed to the contractors. Greenspoon Demolition began work the very next day. Initially, there were few visible signs of progress as all of the preparatory work was completed within the walls but by the middle of March, our old building began to come tumbling down. Now in mid-April, demolition is virtually complete, and Greenspoon will soon turn a clear and level building site over to Aquacon, our construction contractor. Excavation work for the footings and foundations of our new building will begin in May. While the timelines remain tight, we are still on schedule with the overall project, and expect to return to our original campus on Steeles Avenue in September, 2003.

Watching the demolition of the Brebeuf building has been a bittersweet experience for many members of our community. While it is a clear sign of progress, and the first significant step in the process that will provide us with enhanced facilities, the old building served us very well. For nearly forty

years, the building was our home, and for thousands of young men it was the place where they came of age, growing physically, intellectually and spiritually during their years at Brebeuf. The experiences within those walls shaped their characters and, in many cases, helped determine life-long interests. Although the physical building no longer exists, the memories remain, and will last forever.

The demolition of the old building and the construction of our new facility will be chronicled on the school website.






