A Message from Our Principal

One afternoon, about two weeks ago, after a gloomy morning, a beautiful rainbow arched over our school. As I admired its brilliant colours, I thought, this augers well...and certainly, the 2006-2007 school year has begun with much promise for the Brebeuf College School community.

As the pages of this edition of the Brebeuf Relations will attest, the enthusiasm, energies, imagination, and dedication of our staff, students, parents, and alumni are channelled into fulfilling the mission of educating young men to their full potential in the Brebeuf ethos of "Men for Others".

On opening day we welcomed two hundred and seventy-five grade nine students and over seven hundred returning students, bringing our student population to over a thousand, the largest in the last four years. Brebeuf students showed leadership by assisting in a special opening day orientation for grade nine students which afford them time to meet new friends, acquaint themselves with teachers and support staff, and familiarize themselves with the new building. Later in September, student leaders under the direction of staff, ran a three-day orientation camp at Muskoka Woods which would strengthen those friendships, acquaint students with the proud Brebeuf tradition of academic, moral, and athletic excellence, and further ease the transition into high school.

Among the many community building initiatives at Brebeuf, two are particularly worthy of mention. In September we saw the return of the Communion Breakfast, the revival of a Brebeuf tradition which brought together three pillars of Catholic Education: family, faith, and school. Our celebrant was Father Winston Rye, a Jesuit and former Brebeuf principal who along with Father Len Altilia, and Jesuit Scholastic, Sean Moore is a steadfast supporter of Brebeuf's many community and spiritual development projects. In early November, students belonging to the Empowered Student Partnership team presented an anti-bullying workshop for the entire student body in order to sensitize students to issues of bullying.

As we look ahead, Brebeuf staff and students will continue to exploit their energies, talents, and creativity in the classroom and beyond in a variety of ways. This month, in the spirit of generosity, Club Brebeuf, an evening of musical performances in a club atmosphere, will generate a substantial donation to the Children's Wish Foundation. In December, the Brebeuf Social Justice Symposium, an annual student-run event involving students and teachers from the greater TCDSB community, will explore issues related to terrorism and faith. This year Brebeuf will host the Social Justice Symposium on the campus of the University of St. Michael's College. In February, staff and students will present Every Body Is a Somebody. Written by Brebeuf Teachers Mr. Paul Adams and Mr. John A. MacDonald, this musical explores issues of teenage self-image. With the approach of Christmas, Brebeuf students will be gearing up for CAN AID, the annual Christmas food drive. One could go on and on. These are but a few examples of how Brebeuf students and staff, with the support of parents and alumni, strive to earn merit through study not for themselves alone but for the service of others.

Welcome to the Brebeuf Gifted and Enrichment Programme! We are happy to be able to offer you an enriched educational experience. Brebeuf College School was founded by the Jesuits in 1963 to offer a superior education in the liberal arts and Catholic traditions, and

to make leaders and "men for others". Brebeuf College School remains committed to these goals and the Brebeuf Gifted and Enrichment Programme is an integral part of that mission. Our motto remains Studio Gradum Faciant - "To win merit through study".

Our programme is not just for students who have been formally identified through an IPRC as gifted. It is an exciting opportunity and means of preparing for the future and to make the most of high school with fellow students who share a thirst for knowledge, challenge, academics, involvement, and fun!

The Gifted and Enrichment Programme is a two-pronged approach to a fully rounded student: the Academic Track, which consists of credit earning opportunities and programme modifications; and Enrichment Activities, which consist of a variety of challenging and high interest voluntary activities.

CREDIT EARNING OPPORTUNITIES

- * Course Accomodations: Gifted students can have courses changed in consultation with teachers and parents to allow for more challenging and interesting material.
- * Independent Study: Students may take courses not offered at Brebeuf through the Independent Learning Centre.
- * International Exchanges: These are available during summers and the school year in France, Italy, Ireland, Scotland, England, and many other
- * Advanced Placement Exams: AP Exams allow students to work at a University level while still in high school. Students who earn qualifying grades on AP Exams are then given credits or advanced placement at thousands of universities worldwide.
- * Enriched (AP and Pre-AP) Courses: These are available for Grades 10, 11, and 12 in English, math, history, and science. These courses offer a more rigorous programme than Academic courses and will prepare students to write AP exams in those subjects. Only students with 80% in the prerequisite course may enroll in Enriched courses.
- * PLAR (Prior Learning Assessment): Students can earn credits if they can show that they have mastered the material for a course through previous learning.

Brebeuf Reads!

As our grade 10 students wrote the EQAO Literacy test on March 29, 2006, the grade nine students were officially introduced to a new initiative called "Brebeuf Reads!" - A Brebeuf College School Reading Forum and Mentorship Program.

Sponsored by the Ministry of Education to the tune of \$20, 000, Brebeuf Reads! aims to foster and improve literacy skills in grade nine students at Brebeuf College School. By sharing their reading experiences electronically, the grade 9 boys will be encouraged to expand the range and purpose of their reading.

In collaboration with OISE/UT Teacher Candidates in an Intermediate/Senior English course, teachers at Brebeuf are exploring unique ways to build a school-wide focus for better reading in less formal atmosphere.

READING FORUM IN OPERATION

Grade 9 students at Brebeuf and Teacher Candidates in an I/S English course at OISE/UT have been "enrolled" in a common eClass Reading Forum. By the means of asynchronous, threaded discussions, weblinks and other online resources, students, teachers and Teacher Candidates alike will be able to review and comment upon a variety of reading materials.

To date, the majority of funds have been spent on acquiring a variety of resources that came from student suggestions. So ... what are the boys reading? The

most popular titles are manga (Japanese comics that read from back to front), followed closely by graphic novels and series, science-fiction and fantasy books. In addition to this, money was spent on magazine subscriptions (everything from sports to science to automobiles) and expanding our literature collection by adding the works of contemporary authors. To follow the adage from Shoeless Joe, "If you build it, they will come," our students have shown that "If you buy it, they will read." As a result of the influx of new titles, book circulation activity has quadrupled in the last few months, and the library has become a frenetic hub of activity before school and at lunch time.

Cross Country, Meet Brebeuf

On day two of this new school year, the Brebeuf Cross-Country team started its rigorous training regiment, practising five to six times a week as a team and an extra day by themselves. The team trained on several terrains, from running one kilometre laps around the perimeter of the school, to practising in Lillian Park, G. Lord Ross Park, Earl Bales Park and pounding the pavement in a more arduous route that ranged from 5-12 km in the neighbourhood. In addition to running, athletes received core training and strength training. Athletes had the support and guidance of two coaches this year, Mr. Guy and Mr. Margou.

In previous years, cross-country has been dominated by schools in Toronto such as Birchmount Park, Northern, Etobicoke, and Leaside, and in our board, by schools such as Michael Power, Cardinal Newman, and Neil McNeil. This year, especially in the junior division, Brebeuf has proven the potential to run, as a team, in competition with the top three teams of our board, although Birchmount Park seems to be sitting a little further from our reach.



The Cross-Country team participated in meets this year. The first meet was held at Etobicoke Centennial Park -- The Joe Sax Memorial Cross-Country Meet -- and was undoubtedly the largest competition with over 1200 runners in the male divisions. Our second meet was held at Boyd Conservation Area: The Cardinal Carter Invitational Meet. Our third and favourite meet was The Toronto Beaches Nike Board walk Relay. This meet consisted of a team of four runners who each ran 3km and tagged the next runner. Brebeuf entered three teams and the first Brebeuf team was behind the first place Track&Field/Cross-Country powerhouse Birchmount Park by 6:37. The fourth, final, and most notable meet was the T.D.C.A.A. Championships held at Boyd Conservation Area. The Midget Boy's 5km Event gave Brebeuf a good start by an 8th place finish by Daniel Seddon. The Junior Boy's 6km Event brought pride

into the runners of Brebeuf as there was a 1st place finish by Adam Silva bringing back a gold medal, a 2nd place finish by Roman Izquierdo bringing back a silver medal, and an overall 3rd place finish by our grade ten team bringing home bronze medals, which also included Muchi Zhu and Dennis Lee. As the final race of the day, the Senior Boys' 7km Event, we saw another spectacular top 10 finish as Beau Mondesir came across the finish at 6th place in an age group where most of the other runners in front of him were one or two years older than him.

Cross-Country is a terrific but demanding sport and also requires year round training. Many of our Cross-Country runners look ahead to Track in the spring & summer and hopefully achieve just as much if not more, by means of intense training throughout the winter. After the Track season, our team will jump right back into the Cross-Country season and hope for another outstanding season. On behalf of the Cross-Country team here at Brebeuf, I would like to thank Mr. Guy and Mr. Margou for their commitment to our team and efficient planning for very specific practices which maximized our potential.



Every Body is a Somebody: The Musical

Every Body is a Somebody is a musical drama written by Brebeuf teachers John Paul Adams and John A. MacDonald.



The script was originally commissioned by the Ontario Ministry of Health and the Hospital for Sick Children in 2001 and became the culminating experience of a study called *Healthy Schools*, *Healthy Kids* targeting girls and boys in grades 6 to 8.

Drawing on many of the ideas from an active learning program originally published by The Body Image Coalition of Peel, the musical promotes healthy body image, positive self-esteem, healthy eating and an active lifestyle for adolescents.

The story, set in a typical "transition years" school and centred on a series of nine musical numbers, follows the poignant struggles of twenty characters as they try to make sense of such issues as worrying about what "They Say", being "Popular", the roles of "Girls and Boys" and "Who Am

After a powerfully symbolic and cathartic dance sequence, cast members and audience alike come to a greater acceptance of themselves and others. Leaving the theatre humming the final tune, *No Worries / Every Body is a Somebody*, it seems everyone has learned something about respecting the diversity among individuals.

After the play, cast members reflect on several of the themes alluded to in the drama by fielding questions from the audience. Notions of media awareness, dealing with family and friends, self-esteem, coping stress and building relationships are all met head on in a fast-paced 45 minutes.

This year's production of *Every Body is a Somebody* will be held on Thursday, February 8th and Friday, February 9th with two shows being performed each day.

The university and college application process is now underway for graduating students. The Student Services Department is conducting application workshops for Grade 12 students who are applying to college and university. We are expecting approximately 150 students to apply to university and 50 students to apply to college. Traditionally, at Brebeuf, 85 % of the students who apply to college and university confirm an acceptance at a post secondary institution. The remaining 15 % return to Brebeuf for an additional year, take a year off, or go directly into the world of work. The university application deadline is Jan.10 /07 and the college application deadline is Feb. 1/07.
