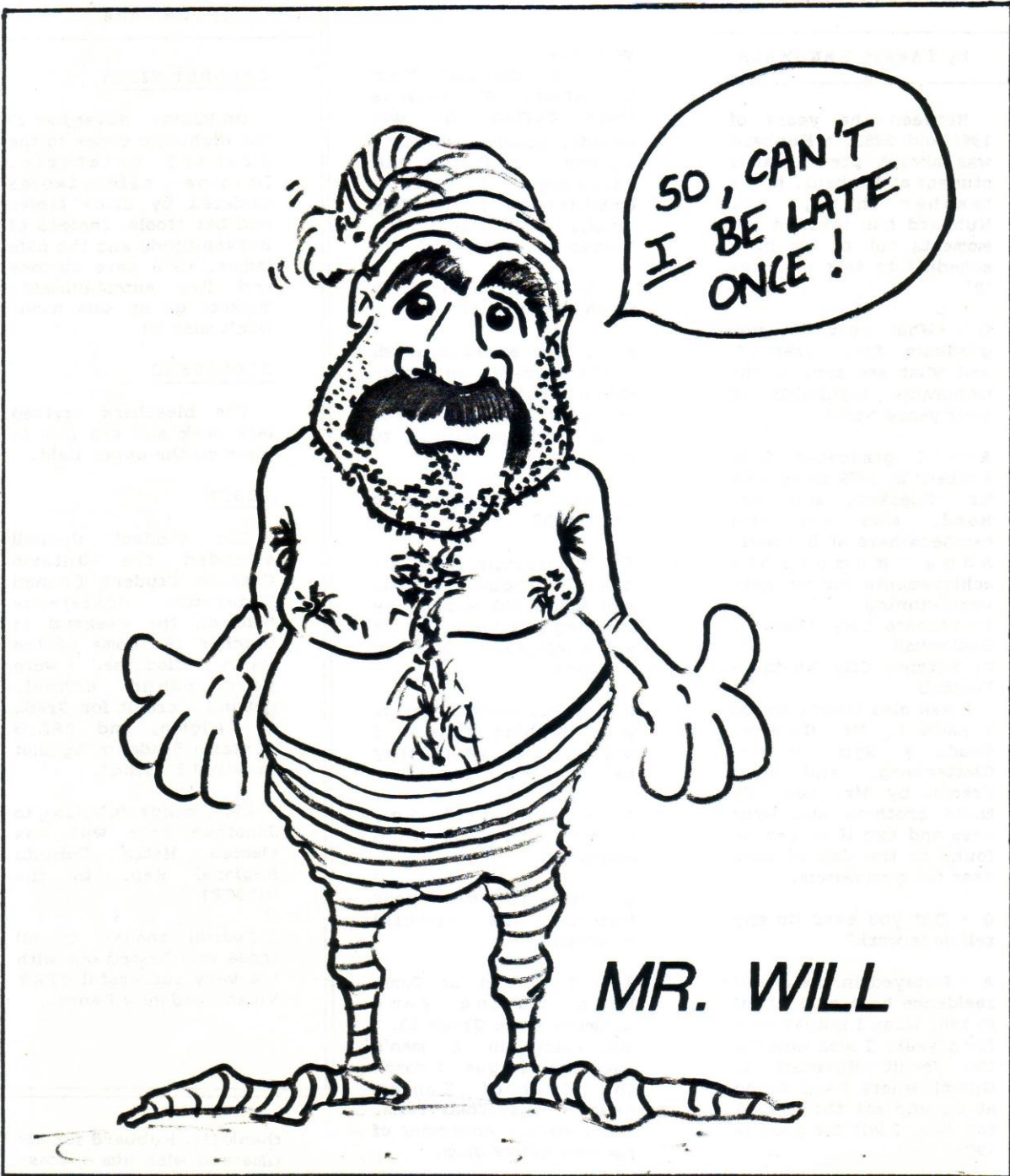

A CALL TO ARMS

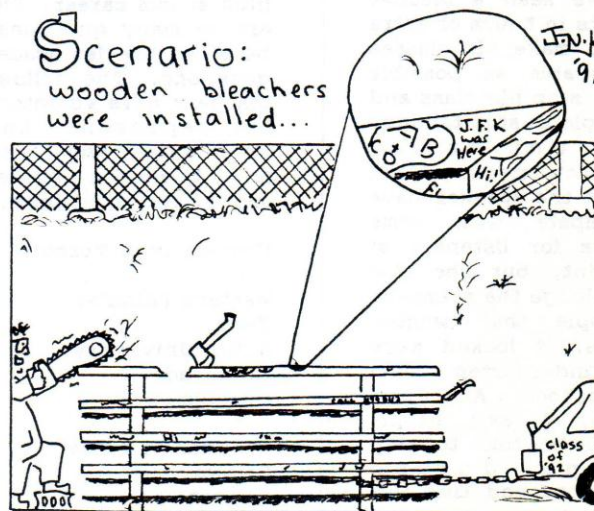
