\$1600 OR ELSE: THE YORK REGION DILEMMA

York Region's board of trustees recently voted to disallow their area's students from attending Metro Catholic schools in an attempt to save a considerable amount of tax revenue. Previously, parents wishing to send their children to schools in Metro could have their taxes transferred to the MSSB, however, this will no longer be accepted. Now, anyone wanting to go to a Metro school, like Brebeuf College and St. Joseph's Morrow Park, will have to pay around \$1600 per year in tuition fees to the MSSB.

This decision will have serious repercussions on a school like Brebeuf, where approximately 250 boys live in York Region. As of next year, even students currently in Grade Twelve will have to pay the tuition or transfer to a York Region school. And while it is possible that some parents will have no problems paying the fee, many people will be forced to leave the school. However, while to force students already attending Metro schools to transfer or pay tuition is unfair, in the eyes of both the York Region board and schools like Brebeuf, the decision is practical.

Brebeuf's problem of overcrowding will be helped by this decision, provided that most of the 250 students (minus 65

WORK TO RULE: A QUESTION OF TIME

For the past week, you have probably heard the deafening silence of the school corridors. The atmosphere seems to be filled with the air of confusion. As of February 10th, the teachers have been on work to rule. Brother Maher agreed to be interviewed in order to inform the students on what work to rule really involves and its effects.


Quite simply, work to rule means that teachers are doing only what they are supposed to do (ironically that means that they must teach). They will only do the work that is specified in their contracts, which does not include coaching, organizing, or supervising extra-curricular activities. According to Brother Maher, as of the 10th, teachers have been required to come in 15 minutes before school starts, and leave 15 minutes after school ends. If they do not abide by this rule, they may be penalized by their union.

Many are convinced that the teachers' union is aiming for major wage increases, however, that is not the case. There has been a deadlock in disputes

with the board over such matters as class size, and certain articles in the teachers' contracts. For instance, if a teacher is absent, rather than calling a substitute, teachers are asked to supervise classes, minimizing their break time between periods.

What has this month for the students? All after school sports activities have been cancelled, and students have been prohibited from using the gym before or after school. The Toronto Regional Semi-Finals for debating, originally scheduled for Monday, February 17, was cancelled. As well, the school musical, "Thin Ice" had to be cancelled. Most of the other school clubs have also been discontinued until this matter is settled.

It may just be a question of time until work to rule is over. Perhaps this term we, the students, may realize that, as Brother Maher puts it, "...a dedicated teacher does not come at 8:00 and leave at 2:40..." There are many committed teachers at Brebeuf, and even though education is for the student, and in the words of Henry Adams, "...a teacher affects eternity, he or she can never tell where his or her influence stops..."

QUESTIONS ABOUT THE B

Q. Who can write for The 'B'?
A. Any Brebeuf student (even niners), staff member, or alumnus can submit articles. Students from our sister schools, SJMP and Loretto Abbey are also welcome to write.

Q. Can students put artwork in The 'B'?

A. Yes, anyone is welcome and encouraged to hand in art, especially theme related (ie. Valentine, Easter). Remember that the art should be drawn in such a way that will be clear when photocopied.

Q. When are articles edited or changed?

A. Generally, there are three types of editing done to an article. If there are grammatical or spelling errors in the submission, they will be corrected. Secondly, if offensive language is used, it will be deleted since Brebeuf is a Catholic school. Lastly, if an article is very

long, the writer might be approached by the editor to see if it can be scaled down.

Q. What can students write about?
A. Any student can write about anything he wants: music, current events, school news, interviews, poetry, humour, sports commentaries. As well, any student who may want to write an article but can't think of anything to write about can talk to Mike Dacosta or any of the subject editors and brainstorm for ideas.

Q. Are all articles that are submitted printed?

A. Usually they are because so far almost all articles received have been of excellent quality. However, if a submission was poorly written, the writer would probably be told how he could improve it. As well, any subject not in the spirit with a Catholic school cannot be printed in The 'B'.





The Environmental Club is now getting settled at Brebeuf. There is currently thirty to forty members and the number increases with each meeting.

Due to the fact that the club is fairly new, the club is not aiming to focus on issues of global scale, but instead focusing on what we can do in our immediate surroundings. Being a school of approximately 1200 students, we create an enormous amount of waste. This can easily be reduced. The Environmental Club is trying to establish that something can be done about this devastation, and it will take very little effort.

The cafeteria is the main waste producing area of the school, and therefore we must concentrate on the reduction of reusable and recyclable items being thrown away. Pop cans are one of the biggest concerns because 89% of the student population uses them.
