Last Spring 93 stddents earned their Secondary School Graduation Dipodomas for Grade 12 - these are the students who are listed in the Graduatoon Programme today and who are graduating from Brebeuf College School. ACADEMIC: MATHEMATICS

A team chosen from our nines and tens entered the M.S.S.B. Mathematics league. Alhtough the team was defeated in the playoffs, four games were won and two lost during the regular season.

ACADEMIC:

In the University of Waterloo Chemistry 13 News Research Assistantiship Examination, two of our Grade 13 students were in the top 300 - John Moore and Mark Quigg.

Each Spring, McMaster Universty sponsors a Physics Prize Contest open to all Gr. 13 Students in Ontario Secondary Schools. This year Brebeuf is pround to announce that 5 of our students finished in the top 20 and were invited to the prize ceremony dinner at McMaster on April 10. These top students were Helen Tsang, Neil McPhail, John Moore, Mark Quigg and Bill Stefanuk, who took 3rd place over-all. Congratulations to sheee students.

THE BREBEUF LAY ADVISORY BOARD;

ACADEMIC:

Last fall Brebeuf entered the exciting new field of micro-computers with the purchapse of 6 Commodore Pet Micro-computers, a printer, and a disc drive. September 1981 will see the introduction of a second course in computer studies at Brebeuf and it will study in depth the field of micro-computers. This past year, two mini-courses on Microcomputers were offerred to students at the Senior level - emphasized were the basic principles of the hardware and a working knowledge of programming in the BASIC language.

STOCK MARKET:

For the first time at Brebeuf, a number of students (20 in all), participated in a Stock Market game organized and co-ordinated by Wilfred Laurier University. Over a three month period, the Brebeuf students, divided into Nations, bought and sold stocks on the Toronto Stock Exchange. Each group operated as if they had \$100,000.00 in cash at the beginning and attempted to maximize their funds. The students were in competition with 800 teams from other high schools across Ontario. Those who paraicipated gained a more intimate knowledge of the stock markets operation which helped in their regular study of the topic in Economics.

On Monday, May 25, Jim Peterson, the local member of Parliament, visited the school and spoke to the Gr. 12 Economics classes. He was able to enlighten the students on the reasons for government actions in the economy and attempted to justify present interest and fiscal policies.

On Monday, June st, a debate was held before the Grade 12 stddents concerning the boycott of Nestle products by groups concerned with the present mehtods of promoting baby formulae.

Representatives from the Nestle Co and from INFACT, the boycott leaders, each presented their points of view to the students.

The point involved had spent some time discussing the issue in class both from the economic and the morel points of view.

A team of four students led the questioning after the debate and all interested students were given a chance to ask questions of both sides.

The debate served to show the effect of organized consumers on a large corporation and also served to demonstrate how confusing a supposedly simple issue can really by.



T.V. BREBEUF CLUB:

The T.V. Brebeuf Club operated out of Room 206 every afternoon after school from 3:15 to 5:00 p.m. producing mini-skits, and T.V. commercials for the Media Arts Course at Brebeuf.

The club was unable to function in Term 3 this year due to equipment failures and the need for repairs. The club does look forward to a new year in 1981-82.

THEATRE BREBEUF:

Theatre Brebeuf began an active year with its October presentation of two one-act plays: "BIGFOOT" and "SHOWDOWN AT SAND VALLEY". The group then assisted in the production of a Christmas pageant as well as a tableau play of the Stations of the Cross on Holy Thursday as presented to the student body. Theatre Brebeuf capped off its season with the well-received production of the play CHARLEY'S AUNT.

The chaplains did a great deal of work in the Archdiocese using Brebeuf as a base. This work set up many valuable future contacts for long-range work and planning for the apostolate. These included:

-involvement in the Catholic High School Chaplains' Association of the Archdiocese of Toronto establishing a personal rapport with chaplains involved in the educational apostolate
-involvmenet in the Resource Day in Jan., sponsored by the High School Chaplains which established many valuable contacts such as Youth Corps, COR retreats etc.
-involvement in area schools and parishes through weekend ministry, afternoons or days of recollection and special masses

-addressing several organizations such as the Catholic Doctors' Guild, the Serra Club (for businessmen and lawyers) on youth -Toronto Right to Life and Halton Right to Life -writing several publications in the Sacred Heart Messenger (based on work with the students at Brebeuf) and in Vanguard Magazine -helping the COR retreat movement (a retreat movement for teenagers) -a substantial commitment as spiritual directors and teachers of the Cursillo Movement of the Archdiocese of Toronto - a movement for renewal and the training of lay leaders in the Catholic Church

STUDENT COUNCIL 1980-81

Under the most able leadership of Frank MacGrath, the Student Souncil enjoyed one of its most productive years. The executive manifested a sense of maturity and responsibility. The Council worked hard on preparing a stddent council constitution, which is presently before Brebeuf's "supreme court". ATHLETICS, 1980-81

The major change in our Athletic programme this year was the establishment of the NATION SYSTEM for our intramural programme. Under the direction of Mr. Daoust, the students and staff were divided into 6 nations and participation of all students in sports grew significantly.
