

PRESENTATION BROTHERS' SPIRIT AND LEGACY AT BREBEUF

We recently learned the sad news that the Presentation Brothers will be withdrawing from Brebeuf and Canada in the summer. This seems an opportune time to reflect on the tremendous influence the Brothers have had on our school. As an alumnus of Brebeuf under the Presentation Brothers, I feel a strong sense of pride to have been taught by and associated with these men of faith. While many Brothers have lived and worked at Brebeuf, the two that stand out most in their involvement are: Brother Lawrence Maher, who was principal from 1984 to 1996; and Brother Henry Spencer, who began teaching in 1984 and though retired by 1998, continued to volunteer daily until this past year. The Brothers are humble though and will not brag about their accomplishments or influence well. Like the Jesuits, they are one of the lungs whose influence has breathed the spirit of Christ into our school in a special way. We are lucky to be a part of this worldwide network of Presentation Schools in the Edmund Rice tradition. Here are some of my observations about their legacy at our school, which I hope will let some of you who are not as familiar with them learn about their importance to us.

Devotion to Mary, Our Lady of the Presentation



Every day, we pray to Mary, our Mother, under the title of Our Lady of the Presentation, from which the order derives its name. Mary plays a prominent role in the spirituality of the Brothers and their schools. The Angelus, recited daily, began under the Brothers, as did the Prayer to the Queen of Heaven every May. The promotion of the rosary is evident too.

Care for the Poor and Charity in the Spirit of Edmund Rice

The Brothers always seem to care for the poor and neglected in our midst. This stems from the work of Blessed Edmund Rice, their Founder, who started schools for poor boys in Ireland in the 19th century. When Brother Maher was principal, there was never a student without a uniform, or a student who missed out on trips because of a lack of ability to pay. A strong sense of commitment to the poor in our society and beyond also comes through in charities like Can-Aid and raising money for the missions in Africa, spearheaded by Brother Spencer.

Commitment to Academic Excellence

The Jesuits, our founding religious order, are rightly credited for starting the academic standards of the school to prepare students well for university and for life. The Presentation Brothers continued that tradition of excellence while offering programmes for students who might not be university-bound. All of God's children are welcome in their schools. Wherever they are found in the world, there is an academic prestige to the Presentation Brothers' institutions that rank among the best.


Development of the Mind, Body, Soul and Family

Brebeuf under the Presentation Brothers has never been just about the classroom. Sports and clubs

and activities that develop the mind, body, and spirit are integral parts of the Brebeuf experience. Brothers dedicated their whole lives to the mission of Brebeuf. They were often the first to arrive in the morning and the last to leave in the evening. Brother Maher created a wonderful sense of family in the staff and students through generosity, attention, and celebration. Brother Spencer makes everyone feel special, as if you are the most important person in the world to him when he is speaking to you. We have been blessed.

SOCIAL JUSTICE SYMPOSIUM

Brebeuf hosted its seventeenth annual Social Justice Symposium on December 5. Normally it is held at the University of St. Michael's College in the University of Toronto, but this year it was virtual. Organized by the Social Justice Club and students in the Gifted programme, over 75 students and teachers from across the city gathered to learn more about the theme of Racism from Black and Indigenous perspectives. Fittingly, the day began with a Paraliturgy for Social Justice celebrated by Father John O'Brien, S.J. It was an excellent opportunity for students to learn more about social justice and ways to combat the scourge of racism.

BROTHER MAHER FUND



Brebeuf College School is pleased to announce that over \$20,000 has been raised since September for the Presentation Brothers' schools in Ghana and Nigeria. This generous funding has come from two main sources: \$11,000 in donations from students, staff, former staff, alumni, parents, and friends of the Brothers; and from a \$9,000 grant from the Ontario English Catholic Teachers Association.

The largest share of funds comes from a special "Christmas Catalogue" where donors can direct their financial gifts to specific areas of need in the schools: lunch programmes, uniforms, fees, books, supplies, and sports equipment. Two junior high school students will also be sponsored to attend secondary school.

The initiative to raise funds for these schools dates back to 2000 when Brother Henry Spencer and students and staff began collecting change for the Presentation Brothers' missions. Money is raised under the "Brother Lawrence Maher Fund for Africa", named for a former principal who helped to oversee the Brothers' expansion into Ghana. The endeavour is an important way that Brebeuf strives to keep the Presentation Brothers legacy and Blessed Edmund Rice charism alive.

WWF- Canada Pollinator Garden

Our "School Grounds Greening Team" is proud to announce that we have been awarded a \$500 grant from World Wildlife Canada as part of our school's growing commitment to the environment and creating sustainable habitats!

Habitats around the world are under threat and are rapidly disappearing and the causes are all due to human activity and our overconsumption of natural resources. The time is now for humanity to adopt a new paradigm, one in which the planet's resources are not exploited for economic gain but protected for the health of our ecosystems and all living things.

This spring, we will be expanding the size of our current pollinator garden to include more native perennial plants. Mass plantings of purple coneflowers and milkweed will provide nectar and seeds for bees, birds, and butterflies. The garden is also an excellent place to learn about the life cycle of plants and how they provide habitat and food for native wildlife all year round.

We are very thankful for this opportunity provided by WWF Canada. We are also proud to be environmental stewards fighting for a planet in which all living things have access to healthy, productive habitats in which to live.

BREBOTICS

After much preparation, Team Brebotics completed their six runs for the second First

Tech Challenge (FTC) Robotics scrimmage round on Thursday, January 21, a precursor event to the official qualifiers in spring. The recording of the runs was preceded by judging sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday, directed through Zoom, where the team had to present themselves and their robot to a panel of judges. Just hours before the Brebotics team recorded their runs, they were able to merge the different robot components that were created by separate members, a building practice that was the unfortunate result of COVID-19. However, thanks to members of the team working very late the night before, a successful run was recorded with quite a good score.

Team Brebotics won first place for the Connect Award, one of the eight available awards for Scrimmage #2! The criteria for the award were an Engineering Notebook and Journal which highlighted their experience with the design and engineering process, as well as additional connectivity to experts in the engineering/robotics field. The Engineering Book was an ongoing project with an admittedly slow start, but it was completed in the nick of time, and the positive reception of it and the team as a whole gives them the extra motivation they need for the upcoming events and really highlights the potential they have to take it all the way.



MATH UPDATE

This year, 2020-2021 the Advanced Placement / Enriched Brebeuf Mathematics programme is well on track toward helping over ninety boys excel at high level mathematics. Due to complications arising from Covid protocols, this year has been divided up into Quad-Mesters and many students have opted for virtual learning, thus diminishing the overall number of students in regular Brebeuf College day school.

In Quad #1 a Grade 11 class easily finished the course at midterm and completed the Grade 12 Advanced Functions course by the end. This class will start up with me again in Quad #3 to do their AP Calculus work. The class will have the chance to write the AP-AB Calculus exam in May and therefore we will need to work very hard to prepare for it.

In Quad #2 the Grade 12 Enriched Calculus and Vectors class finished all work with vectors, have reviewed all first year University Calculus, and have finished most of second year University Calculus. They have the option of writing the AP-BC Calculus exam in May, and I would expect that most of them would be able to obtain near perfect on the exam if they choose to do so. The final class average in this class was 89% with two students, Jacob Knock and Deven Liscombe finishing with 100%. I am most proud of all these students and commend them for their hard work and effort toward achieving excellence in Mathematics.

DEBATING



No club better prepares students for professions such as law, teaching, business, and politics than debating. Plus, students learn to develop public speaking skills, logic,

confidence. This year, we have a combined club with students from Brebeuf and St. Joseph Morrow Park. Each week students assemble on zoom to discuss issues and practise debating on a variety of topics.

The team has participated in two virtual debates so far. The team of Alexander Francis and William Kischuk did well enough to qualify for the Ontario Provincial Championship Tournament at the end of February! Good luck lads!

SCIENCE CORNER



The Faculty of the Science Department at Brebeuf College, together with students, have demonstrated commitment to sustain the students' wellbeing and high achievements in all the science courses.

Regardless of the implementation of new ways of teaching and learning practices, students in science

classes have been provided with numerous enriched learning experiences that include hands-on activities, application of technology, and workshops with diverse scientific institutions. The purpose of providing students with a wide spectrum of experiences is to develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills that are fundamental to understand, evaluate and integrate in coherent scientific research and developments.

The Science Department organized a series of workshops allowing students to engage with researchers in diverse scientific fields. The first workshops were with Pablo Science, a charitable organization working to advance science education in Canada and around the world. Another workshop that inspired students on many levels was with Michael Houghton, the co-recipient of the 2020 Nobel Prize for discovering Hepatitis C. Students also had the opportunity to collaborate with researchers at the Laboratory of Medicine and Pathobiology at the University of Toronto on the topic of elucidating the role of the Cystic Fibrosis Transmembrane Regulator (CFTR) protein in human lung development and Translational Research Program. During these workshops, students gained knowledge about research skills and, by engaging in discussions related to their areas of interest, were inspired by the possibility of a career in science.

The Science department is working collectively towards the goal of participating in a major science community event such as the Toronto Science Fair.

This is what **Felipe De Paula** had to say about his experiences in the science program.

“Being in the Grade 9 Advanced Placement Science course and participating in the workshops with Pueblo Science, Nobel Prize winner for 2020 Michael Houghton and Laboratory of Medicine and Pathobiology was an enlightening and extremely helpful experience. The learning experiences through hands-on activities and the use of technology in the science class has been extended by participation in presentations from

the researchers which has helped me shape the path I would take towards how to approach my science projects. This collaboration with the researchers helped me to have a deeper understanding of the instructions provided by my teacher during the class and Science Club discussions. The experiences from the Science Class through the variety of presentations has made me take more seriously my learning and the academic success in high-school compared to elementary. I noticed how what I do now affects my future and how much I have grown in my academic skills, matured and how much I still need to do. Through these events I learned that opportunities are priceless and I should experience them to the max, and take advantage over the fact that I have access to all of these experiences at such a young age. To be completely honest, the scientists sharing their experiences made me want to deepen my knowledge in the scientific field of medicine, because it is a way I could help people. The activities provided in the science classes made me realize the area I am interested to study for my future and that the opportunities are available to me if I reach out for it with help and support. I am grateful for classroom learning experiences and to the presenters in different workshops for helping me increase my thirst for knowledge”.

One group played Family Feud with the St. Joe's council, and the other played Jeopardy with Brebeuf's for approximately 20 minutes, before being sent back to watch the movie. This process was then repeated after the next 40 minute interval, except that time the groups were switched.

Alex Brooks, a member of Brebeuf's student council, says that "Quaran-tine's day was a great opportunity for students from Brebeuf and St. Joe's

to meet and further existing friendships virtually. The trivia games offered a great opportunity for friendly competition between the two schools."

After the movie finished, the night capped off with the Kahoot, which tested participant's knowledge of the movie they just watched. Amazingly, the winner of the Kahoot won by only three points, and everybody in the top three got perfect scores on the quiz. It was an exhilarating way to end the night.

"Quar-antine's day was a great event to come together as a brother and sister school" remarks the St. Joe's student council. "We got compliments from our girls regarding how much they enjoyed the competition with the boys. Also, the interaction students had with one another was definitely an experience, and as a council we hope it was fun."

The event was a fun way for students to engage with each other during a time of social isolation, and hopefully served to make this Valentine's Day a memorable one. It was seen as a great success by both councils, and Brebeuf's Nick Boyle hopes that it will lead the two to "set up another event like this in the future.
