BREBEUF WINS CARTY AWARD



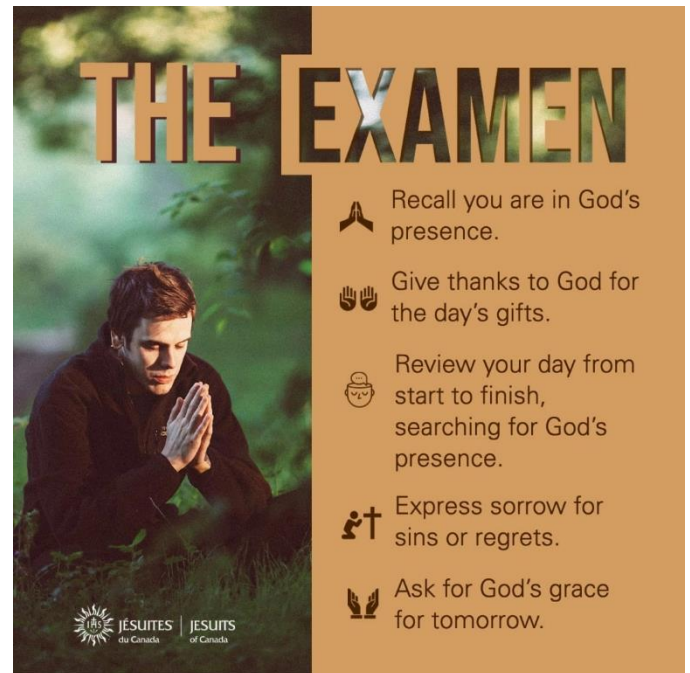

CAMP ROBIN HOOD

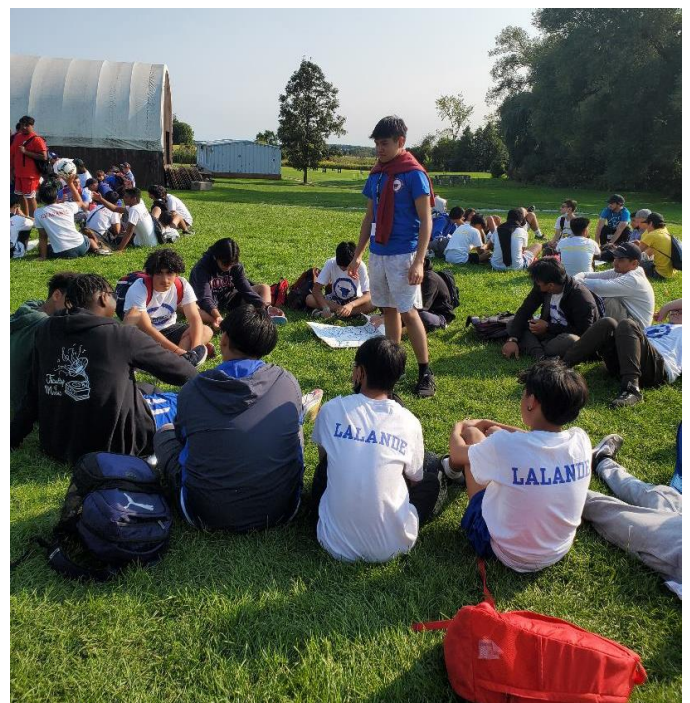

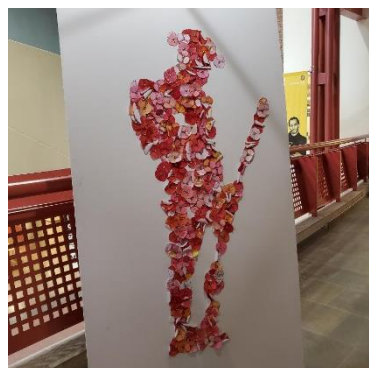

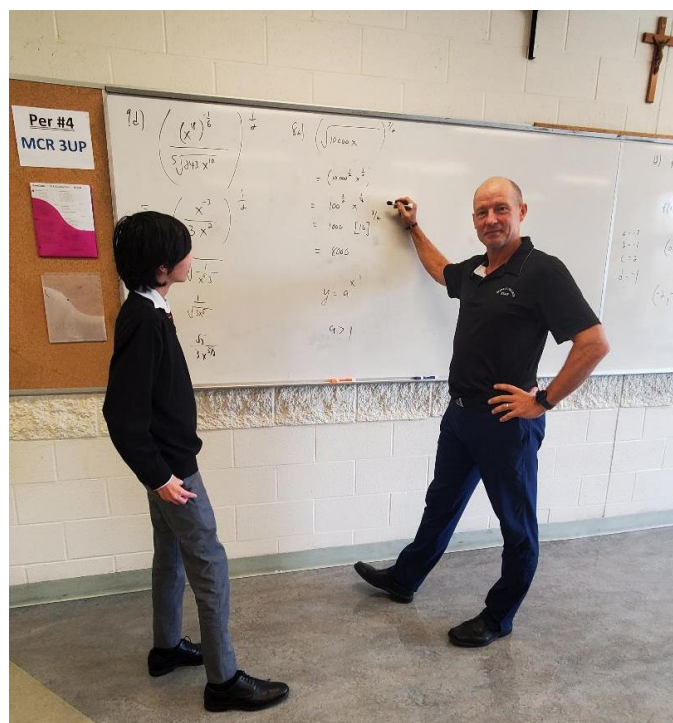

MATH UPDATE

Semester One has a Grade 9 STEAM Class of twenty-six students, a Grade 11 Enriched Class of thirty-one students, and a Grade 12 Enriched

Calculus class with ten students. The current class averages for these classes is in the 82 – 86% range.

The enriched AP Calculus class has finished all first year university Calculus and is now about to study second year Calculus, including partial derivatives, double and triple integrals, and differential equations.

In Semester Two beginning in January, the Grade 11 class continues and takes the 12 Advanced Functions course, which we will have already finished in the Grade 11 class. Thus, we can study AP Calculus and the students can write the AP Calculus exam in early May.

There will be a Grade 9 and Grade 10 STEAM class in Semester Two as well.

SUPPORTING THE UNIFORM

with a Mass in the chapel celebrated by Father Winston Rye, S.J., former principal and rector, and assisted by Deacon Paul Bar '79. Afterwards the Induction Ceremony was held at Bayview Golf and Country Club with many of the inductees' families and friends in attendance, along with staff, former staff, and alumni.

GEORGE MACRI '68

George is one of our most dedicated alumni who personifies a "man for others". George has consistently supported Brebeuf over the past fifty years, helping to honour some of Brebeuf's earliest faculty members by establishing academic awards and scholarships recognizing teachers like O'Neil Gazeley, Lou Puccini and E.J. Barry.

Whenever Brebeuf has held a fundraising campaign George has contributed, whether for the "New Building Fund" campaign in 1999-2000 or the return of football in 2018. During the 50th Anniversary celebrations in 2014, George went out of his way to donate back to Brebeuf some very unique Jesuit artifacts that he had been able to acquire; he wanted them to be at Brebeuf as a tribute to the religious order that founded the school.

George makes his many contributions to Brebeuf very quietly and without any request for recognition. George has also been a long standing supporter of The Jesuits of Canada as well as a Board Member, donor and volunteer with the Providence Centre Health Care Foundation as well as with charitable organizations such as Cystic Fibrosis Canada, Camp Winston and the Amarok Society.

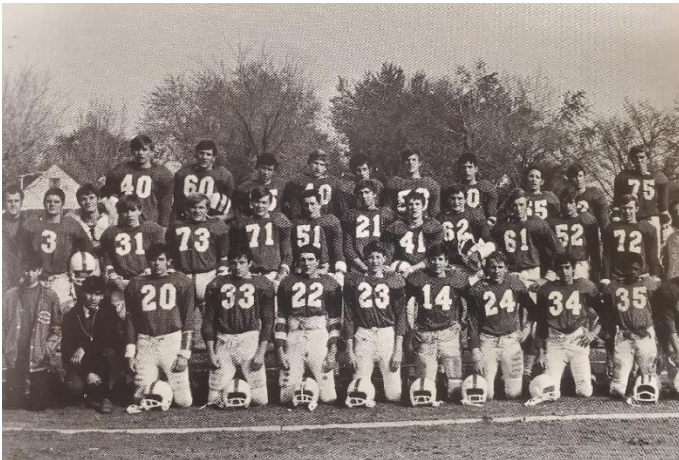
Wheels, Big Brothers and Sisters of Winnipeg, Never Alone Foundation, Children's Wish Foundation and A and O Services for Older Adults.

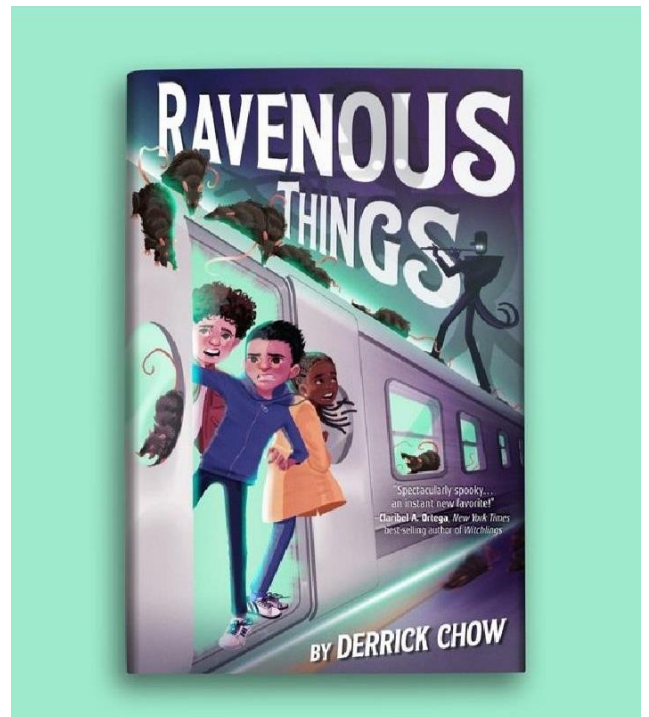
