### Principal's Message

The school year is quickly progressing and summer holidays are a very distant memory. The September startup has progressed quite well. Classes are running very smoothly. Students can choose from a variety of varsity teams, clubs and intramural activities. I ask you to encourage your son to get involved in school life and gain a more complete experience.

Enclosed with this newsletter is a copy of your son's report card. This mid-term assessment provides you with an indication of how your son is doing in each of his courses. Praise should be provided where it is warranted and encouragement should be given where it is required.

On Thursday, November 23rd parent/teacher interviews will be held. This evening provides an opportunity for you to meet with your son's teachers to discuss his progress. I encourage you to attend this evening. Appointments can be arranged by son sign up with his subject teachers for appropriate times.

The student council members are heavily involved in school activities. A very successful opening BBQ was conducted by the council. Our grade 9 students attended Camp Olympia from September 27 - 29. Mr. MacDonald, staff and senior students ran a highly successful camp experience for the grade 9 students. The reports indicate that everyone had a great time.

On October 11 and 12 the grade ten students had the opportunity to write the province-wide literacy test. Results from these tests will be provided at a later date. Successful completion of this test is not required for this year's grade 10 students. They will be able to graduate without this literacy test requirement. However, the current grade nine class will require successful completion of the grade 10 literacy test in order to graduate and receive diplomas. This group will write the test in the next school year.

The Catholic School Advisory Council is up and running. The next council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 28. All meetings start at 7:00 p.m. and are held in either the Library or the Staff Room. The council is still looking for new members. I encourage you to join.

On Tuesday, October 3, a meeting was conducted at the school regarding the construction of the new school. Trustee Clune and Superintendent O'Keefe were in attendance. Mr. O'Keefe provided a very informative presentation on the options being considered for Brebeuf College as it applies to relocation. The members of the community who were present on this evening indicated very clearly their desire to remain on site while the new school is constructed. Fortunately, the school community's wishes have been heeded and construction is slated to begin as soon as possible.

On Thursday November 16, Friday November 17, and Saturday November 18, a Las Vegas musical revue and comedy production will occur at the school. I encourage you to support the school community by your attendance at one of these three evening productions.

I look forward to seeing you at parent/teacher interviews as well as related school activities.

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## Brebeuf Has Seven Winners



**W**e are pleased to inform you that seven students at Brebeuf have won the Province's new "Aiming-for-the-Top" Tuition Scholarships. The students who will receive this award are identified in the attached "High School Winners" list.

We would like to take this opportunity to extend our congratulations to these students, their teachers, and to your high school. Personalized certificates for the scholarship winners will be presented.

"Aiming-for-the-Top" is a new program that the Ontario Government has introduced to reward students who graduate with top marks at their high school, and who plan to continue their studies at an Ontario college or university. Students who maintain an 80 per cent average at the postsecondary level can receive these scholarships, which are worth up to a maximum of \$3,500 per year for up to four years in total.

This year, the Government invested more than \$8 million in "Aiming-for-the-Top-Tuition-Scholarships" that are being issued to more than 4,000 students from high schools across Ontario. When the program is fully implemented, in 2003, the annual investment will be \$35 million and more than 15,000 students per year will benefit. Details about the application process and program brochures were sent to all High School Guidance Offices in the Spring.

We can all be very proud of the accomplishments of these students. As they move on to college to university, their "Aiming-for-the-Top-Tuition-Scholarships" will provide both concrete financial support and recognition of their academic achievement.

## GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

Students are encouraged to visit the Guidance Department for information and/or counselling. Counsellors welcome the opportunity to meet with students and parents. The department offers a variety of services and leadership programs. Such services and programs include Career Counselling, Academic Counselling, Personal Counselling, Conflict Mediation, Drug Prevention Program, S.T.A.R.S., Peer Tutoring, and the Holocaust Study Group.

The counsellors in the Guidance Department for the 2000-2001 school year are Mr. Lato, Mr. Murphy, and Mr. Rogers. The department would also like to extend a welcome to the new Guidance Secretary, Mrs. Debra Barbuto. Mrs. Barbuto has previously worked in the Payroll and Purchasing departments at the school board head office. The Guidance Department will greatly benefit from Mrs. Barbuto's skills, experience, and pleasant demeanor. Also, working in conjunction with Guidance is Mrs. Denise Fitzpatrick, who is the Child and Youth Worker at Brebeuf. Mrs. Fitzpatrick begins her third year at Brebeuf and provides invaluable assistance to our students. Providing further assistance and support are Mrs. Odette Fernandes (Social Worker), Mrs. Marci Buhagiar (Psycho-educational Consultant), and Mrs. Rosemary Gaensewing (Programming and Assessment Teacher). These support personnel work with students to help them overcome social, emotional, and/or behavioural problems that may affect their ability to succeed in their academics and their ability to be contributing members to the Brebeuf community.

## Graduate Summary - June 2000

There were 170 students who graduated from Brebeuf in June 2000. Of these, 149 applied to an Ontario university and 114 registrations were confirmed for September 2000. There were 64 graduates who were recognized as Ontario Scholars. Those students who did not register at an Ontario university for September 2000 have pursued a variety of alternatives, including the following: university outside of Ontario, college, entered the workforce, or returned to high school to improve their credentials. There were 36 students who applied to an Ontario community college for September 2000.

## PROGRAMS

**1. Opening Doors**

For the second consecutive year, the Brebeuf Guidance Department, along with the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, will be delivering a personal and social skills program in Semester 2 for a select group of Grade 9 students. The program is called "Opening Doors" and its purpose is to help teens develop and improve social skills that will help them avoid problems with school failure, dropping out, and drug/alcohol abuse. Opening Doors will be offered during the school day and Mr. Murphy will coordinate the program here at Brebeuf.

**2. Students and Teachers Against Racism and Sexism (S.T.A.R.S.)**

Students and Teachers Against Racism and Sexism (S.T.A.R.S.) is a program consisting of approximately twenty-five students from Grades 9 to OAC. It is designed to educate others about these topics through an open forum of discussion. This student directed workshop develops strategies for action to empower youth to use these strategies when faced with racism and sexism in the home, at school, and in the workplace. Mr. Rogers and Ms. Johnston are the moderators.

**3. Conflict Meditation Program**

Conflict Meditation is a program designed to help students resolve disagreements in a non-adversarial manner. This program has been operating for eight years at Brebeuf in which approximately 20 students per year are trained to deal with controversy and conflict in a constructive manner. It has established a climate of equality, fairness, and cooperative problem solving in which there is a sense of shared responsibility for school issues and problems. Ms. Fitzpatrick and Mrs. Will are the coordinators.

**4. Peers Against Drugs**

Brebeuf works in partnership with the organization "Parents Against Drugs" to deliver a drug prevention program to Grade 8 students in neighbouring elementary schools. The program is implemented using a peer-to-peer model in which fifteen high school students are trained to deliver a curriculum that includes values clarification, effective decision-making strategies, understanding the dynamics of peer pressure, and drug and alcohol information. The classes take place for one hour on three consecutive days in April. Mr. Murphy will coordinate the program.

**5. Anger Management Program**

Through this interactive workshop students from Grades 10 – 12 will learn that everyone experiences anger. It is a normal, natural, and manageable part of communication with others. The student will learn to identify anger styles, practise effective ways of expressing themselves, and will learn specific techniques for handling angry behaviour. Ms. Fitzpatrick coordinates this program.

**6. Peer Tutoring Program**

The tutoring program at Brebeuf invites senior students to give their time and talent to help younger students who require academic assistance in a particular course. The program is designed to help students learn and to help students feel good about themselves as learners. Students who accept this one-to-one tutoring are expected to pay a nominal fee of \$7.00 per hour to the senior student. Mr. Rogers coordinates this program.

**7. Holocaust Study Group**

Events in Europe during World War II caused the death of many soldiers as well as civilians. In particular, the Jewish inhabitants suffered grievous losses from the deliberate policies of the governing Nazi party in Germany. An opportunity is made available to learn more about this historical period and its relevance to current anti-racist education through guest speakers and a visit to the Holocaust Museum. Mr. Lato and Brother Spencer are the moderators.





## What The Chaplaincy Department Has To Say



**B**rebeuf College School offers excellence in a variety of academic subjects and creative arts, but we must not forget a commitment to respond to the deeper religious aspirations of the students. Brebeuf pursues its goals in the context of the Christian vision of life, a vision that gives everything in the school its character and direction.

Our school year begins with a Eucharistic celebration of the Holy Spirit, attended by the entire Brebeuf Community. At this time we ask for God's blessing for the new school year. "Unless the Lord build the house, they labour in vain who build it." (Psalm)

Each morning at Brebeuf, a paraliturgy, including distribution of the Eucharist, is celebrated. Mass is also frequently celebrated in the school chapel at 7:35 A.M..

At 8:30, Morning Prayer is said over the P.A. system. Teachers, students and administration take a particular week to prepare the theme and lead the community in prayer. At the end of Period 1, the Brebeuf Family Angelus is recited. The Regina Coeli is said during the Easter Season.

On the First Friday of each month, the Eucharistic celebration takes place in our gym at 8:30 A.M.. Before the First Friday mass in May, we celebrate the symbolic crowning of our Blessed Mother. On May 5th, the Feast of Blessed Edmund Rice, founder of the Presentation Brothers, is celebrated, and on September 26 we celebrate the feast of our school's patron, St. Jean de Brebeuf.

The Advent and Lenten seasons are especially celebrated. A special Advent corner with the appropriate symbols is set up in the school entrance and posters depicting the season's liturgical symbols are placed on the walls of the corridors, the stairways and the foyer of the school become a reminder to staff and students of the appropriate preparation for the feasts of Christmas (Nativity) and Easter (Resurrection). Before school closes in December, a paraliturgy is held to mark the Christmas season. The washing of the feet on Holy Thursday brings the Lenten season to a fitting end. During Advent, the poor are not forgotten with **Can-Aid**, a collection drive that is led by the World Issues Students. During Lent, class masses are celebrated and a special day is given to the celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. This year, Reconciliation will be celebrated school-wide on December 6, 2000.



Each class, as part of its religious education, participates in a retreat. Members of Les Donnés help at the liturgical services of the faith community, tutor their peers, and visit the elderly at Extendicare in our area. "Love one another as I have loved you." is their motto.

The central goal of Chaplaincy is to serve the staff and students of Brebeuf College School. The secondary school lives and grows as a unique Catholic Christian community. The Chaplaincy team provides support for those who believe and evangelization for those who are less committed. The team is also available to provide spiritual counseling to those who require it.

In brief, the goal of the Chaplaincy is one of service to others. The Chaplaincy team facilitates participation in prayer and sacraments and helps the development within the school of a **Community of Faith**, which models the mission of the Church in our culture and society.

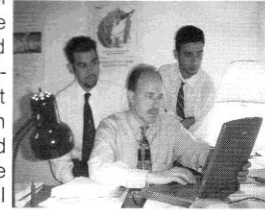

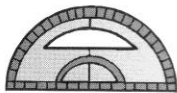
### CO-OPERATIVE EDUCATION IS MORE THAN LEARNING

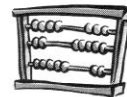

### MATH MATTERS



**G**o figure. That's what over forty of Brebeuf's best mathematics students did in October in the first of a series of six Canadian National Math League games sponsored by the University of Windsor. A perfect team score of 30 out of 30 vaulted Brebeuf to the front of this competition involving some 350 Canadian schools.

A number of our students are now busily preparing for the Canadian Invitational Math Challenge to be held in late November. Last year, an outstanding result by Magno Yu in this contest earned him a scholarship from the University of Waterloo.

In classroom news, the new Grade 10 academic and applied curriculum is currently being implemented. Challenging and interesting to be sure, these courses include the study of quadratic equations and trigonometry, topics previously studied in Grades 11 and 12.

At the Grade 9 level, our students will be writing the province wide EQAO ( Education Quality and Accountability Office ) test next January. This assessment will be written over a two day period and will encourage the use of the popular TI 83 + graphic calculators that your son is now using in his mathematics class. Our teachers are working diligently with your son to ensure his success in this new provincial evaluation.

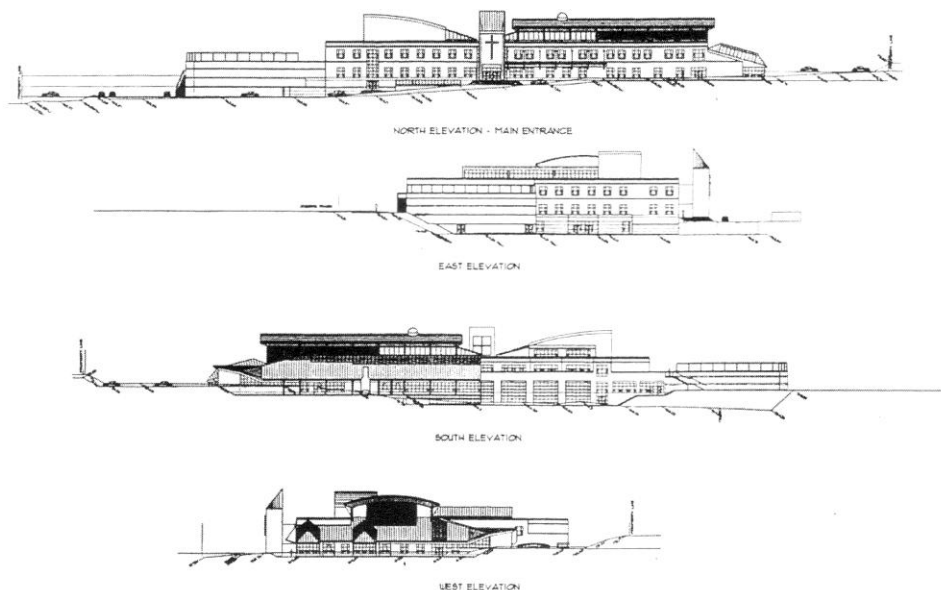
